## **Drug-Related Behaviors Among** NATIVE AMERICAN YOUTH IN NEW MEXICO 2009 Youth Risk & Resiliency Survey

#### **Overview**

#### Grades 6th -12th


Studies show that few youth use more illicit drugs without first trying marijuana. Using marijuana also puts children and teens in contact with people who use and/or sell other drugs. Marijuana is the most commonly used drug among youth in New Mexico (grades 6-12), including Native American youth. Results from the 2009 NM Youth Risk and Resiliency Survey (YRRS) indicate the following for Native Americans:


Students who currently use marijuana were more likely to start at a young age, drink alcohol, smoke cigars, have had sex and been in a physical fight.

Students who do NOT currently use marijuana were more likely to receive A's & B's and have parents who know where they are and with whom.

Fortunately, drug related behaviors, including marijuana use, are preventable and there are protective factors that may discourage Native American youth in New Mexico from using drugs.







#### **Warning Factors of** Marijuana Use\*

Tried marijuana before age 13 Currently drinks alcohol Currently uses methamphetamines Currently uses cocaine Closest friends use drugs Smokes cigarettes at school Currently smokes cigars Recently skipped or ditched school Has had sex Has been in a physical fight at school 1 in 3 high school students have been offered or sold drugs at school

62% of current marijuana users tried it before age 13

#### **Protective Factors Against** Marijuana Use\*

Student thinks it is harmful to smoke marijuana

Parents think it is wrong for student to smoke marijuana

Receives mostly A's & B's


Parents know where their student is and with whom


Student is involved in school sports or clubs

Family has clear rules about drug and alcohol use

# 1 in 7 high school students recently used pain killers to get high










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## 10% of middle school students tried marijuana before age 11

#### Warning Factors of Marijuana Use<sup>\*</sup>

Tried marijuana before age 11 Currently drinks alcohol Currently smokes cigars Has had sex Receives mostly D's & F's On school days spends 3 or more hours playing computer or video games Has been in a physical fight

#### Protective Factors Against Marijuana Use\*

Student thinks it is wrong for students their age to drink

Parents know where their student is and with whom

Receives mostly A's & B's

Parents think it is wrong for students to drink Student is involved in the community

## **DEMOGRAPHICS**

In the New Mexico 2009 Youth Risk & Resiliency Survey, 7,822 Native American students in grades 6-12 answered the questions about drug use.

#### **High School Students**

Female = 1,907Male = 1,962Gender not reported = 10Total 3,879

#### **Middle School Students**

Female = 1,952Male = 1,982Gender not reported = 9Total 3,943

## DEFINITIONS

<sup>1</sup>Grades 9-12 drug use includes: marijuana, cocaine, inhalants, heroin, methamphetamines, ecstasy, pain killers and illegal injectable drugs. Grades 6-8 drug use includes: marijuana, cocaine, inhalants, and illegal injectable drugs.

<sup>2</sup>"Current Marijuana use" is marijuana use at least once in the past 30 days.
